Class Washington History

Learning Objective(s):

Introductory lesson: “**Just the Facts**” to familiarize students using basic tools (vocabulary / timeline) to better understand the Suffrage Movement.

Humanities Content:

Washington State History during the Progressive Era. This two period lesson utilizes the computer lab or computers on wheels (C.O.W.). Option for students to pair up and share computer and grade / evaluation.

Activities:

Define vocabulary using word (vocabulary) in a complete sentence.
Research, create, and plot significant Suffrage events as they occurred on a timeline. This will show the evolving progression of Suffrage supporters.

Student Outcomes (and how did you measure them):

This introductory assignment will introduce the topic of suffrage to the students. Upon completion, the class will create a large timeline on the classroom wall using the data they found. Completion of assignment will be given a point value.

*Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth C. Stanton first meet on a street corner in Seneca Falls, N. Y.

*Kansas puts a woman's suffrage proposal on the ballot for a direct vote—it loses.

*The Anti-Suffrage Party is founded by wives of prominent men.

*Wyoming gives women the vote in its state constitution.

*Colorado adopts women's suffrage.

*Utah grants suffrage.

*Washington State adopts women's right to vote.

*Mrs Frank Leslie bequests one million dollars for the suffrage cause.

*President Wilson gives first public support of a federal woman suffrage amendment.

*The Nineteenth Amendment is quietly signed into law granting women the right to vote.
